1. Jeremiah survives during hard economic times provides us with what assurance?

(Jeremiah 27:21) According to King Zedekiah, commanded, and they then put Jeremiah in custody in the Courtyard of the Guard, and there was a gang of six hundred men of Israel to help him from the street of the palace, until all the bread was exhausted from the city. And Jeremiah continued speaking in the Courtyard of the Guard.

Jeremiah has been sustained the faithful prophet Jeremiah during hard economic times. Jeremiah survived the Babylonian siege of Jerusalem, when people had to 'eat bread by weight and in anxious care' (Ezekiel 4:16) Eventually the famine in the city became so severe that people were eating the flesh of their own children. (Lamentations 2:20) Even though Jeremiah was in custody because of his fearless preaching, Jeremiah saw to it that 'around him' was 'bread for his only' until all the bread was exhausted from the city. — Jeremiah 27:21.

So Jeremiah, like Elijah, had little to eat. The Scriptures do not tell us what or how often Jeremiah ate after Jerusalem was cut off from food. Yet, we know that Jeremiah sustained them and that he was eventually the king of Israel.

Today, poverty exists in every part of the world. According to the United Nations, the greatest concentration of poverty is found in Africa. Based on UN press releases in 1998, "July half of all Africans are impoverished." Despite increasingly fair economic circumstances, an ever-growing number of Africans are adopting Bible principles in the ancient family serving God, confident that he will sustain them. 2. In what ways do Christians with an earthly hope imitate the life example of Elisha-motech?

(Jeremiah 28:5-11) So Elisha-motech went out of the house of the king and spoke to the king, saying, "O my lord the king, these men have done badly all that they have done to Jeremiah the prophet, when they have thrown him into the stocks, so that he will die when there is no because of the famine. For there is no bread anymore in the city." Then the king commanded Elisha-motech to say to the king, saying, "Take in your charge these men, place them in the stocks, and you shall see Jeremiah the prophet die, as all the Israelites are dying." Accordingly Elisha-motech took the man in his charge and went into the house of the king to break the measure and took from there seven rods and went out pieces of cloth and laid them down to Jeremiah in the stocks by means of the ropes. Then Elisha-motech the Elisha-motech answered, "O my lord the king, do not let the king and the people of the city put your hands beneath the stocks." Jeremiah rowed to go. Finally they drew out Jeremiah by means of the ropes and brought him out of the stocks, and Jeremiah continued to dwell in the Courtyard of the Guard.

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
